

# **U.S. Student Fulbright Grant**

## **Purpose**

Facilitates cultural exchange through direct interaction on an individual basis in the classroom, field, home, and in daily tasks, you can gain an appreciation of others' viewpoints and beliefs, the way they do things, and the way they think. This grant also promotes mutual understanding through engagement in the community. You can interact with your hosts on a one-to-one basis in an atmosphere of openness, academic integrity, and intellectual freedom.

## **Award**

Provides support for study/research/teaching in a single country. You can meet, work, live with and learn from the people of the host country, sharing daily experiences. This allows for individually designed study/research or an English Teaching Assistantship. You can propose a project and/or study plan that will take place during one academic year in a country outside the U.S.

## **Eligibility**

U.S. citizen, who will have a bachelor's degree by the beginning date of the grant, but will not have a doctorate degree as of October 18, 2010, and who is thinking of studying, assistant-teaching English, or conducting research abroad are eligible. Recent BA/BS graduates Graduating seniors and recent bachelor's-degree recipients usually propose projects for which they have had some undergraduate preparation and/or direct work or internship experience. The Fulbright U.S. Student Program has a preference for candidates who have not had recent extensive experience abroad (excluding recent undergraduate study abroad), especially in the country of application.

## **Deadline**

Campus deadline for 2010 is September 24.
