Landmark camp offered at New Harmony

Day camp for kids focuses on landmarks, architecture and history

Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana and Historic New Harmony offer a one-day camp for children ages 8-12 on Thursday July 10 at the New Harmony Atheneum. Participants spend the day discovering the architecture and landmarks—history in 3D—of New Harmony. The camp runs from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Campers will explore New Harmony and enjoy hands-on activities. The children will find their way through the historic labyrinth before creating their own stained glass designs. They'll visit several historic churches and build their own model using recycled materials.

This is the second year for the New Harmony ArchiCamp. Winner of a prestigious award from the American Association of State and Local History, ArchiCamp encourages children to use their imaginations and powers of observation while they learn about history, architecture, and renovation.

Cost of the camp is \$25 and includes refreshments, educational materials, and souvenirs. Campers should bring a sack lunch. Enrollment for the camp is limited to 20 children.
