**ERIC** ([Educational Resource Information Center](#)) is the most relevant, comprehensive database for education research. It indexes approximately 600 education journals and magazines, such as the Journal of Educational Psychology and Horn Book Magazine. Full-text journal content is often available through the ERIC database, or via the links to full-text journals in Rice Library's other research databases. In addition, ERIC contains lesson plans and curricula for preK-12, conference papers, technical reports, and policy papers.

### **Why use ERIC?**

Using ERIC allows you to search the largest clearinghouse of scholarly education information.

Use ERIC if you have research questions like these:

- Where can I find research studies about math anxiety?
- Where can I find lesson plans for teaching a thematic unit on oceans?
- How do I develop an IEP (individualized education program) for a high school student in a writing class who has Asperger's Syndrome?

### **How do I access ERIC?**

Go to

[www.usi.edu/library/index.asp](http://www.usi.edu/library/index.asp) and choose "Databases." In the subject list on the left side, click on "Education & Physical Education," and then on "ERIC (Education)."

ERIC is also provided free through the U.S. Department of Education ([www.eric.ed.gov](http://www.eric.ed.gov)) and contains full-text lesson plans and curricula for preK-12, conference papers, technical reports, and policy papers. The disadvantage to using this free version of ERIC is that the journals and magazines are not full-text. Full-text of journals and magazines can only be obtained by using Rice Library's ERIC database, which is an EBSCO product.
