Full-Time Faculty by College


Since 2001, all five colleges have seen double digit increases in the percentage of full-time faculty.

Ratio of Full-Time to Part-Time Faculty by College

As the colleges increased their numbers of full-time faculty, most also improved their ratios of full-time to part-time faculty. For example, in 2001, 38% of the faculty in the College of Business were part-time, but only 22% were part-time in fall 2010.



Faculty Growth by Rank


Over the past 10 years, the total number of USI faculty has grown by 15%, from 569 in 2001 to 656 today.

- 37.5% increase in tenured/tenure-track faculty
- 10.0% increase in full-time instructors
- 4.7% increase in part-time/adjunct instructors

The influx of new assistant professors over the past 10 years is reflected in the increase of tenure-track faculty members and decline in percentage of tenured faculty.


Tenure Status of Full-Time Faculty



Full-Time Faculty by Rank

The number of full-time faculty has increased 27% since 2001, and the composition of full-time faculty has changed. Currently, over one-third of full-time faculty are assistant professors, reflecting continued effort to hire new professors to fulfill the ever-growing need for additional faculty.

Faculty Research Projects

Sponsored Research has seen substantial growth in the number of external proposals submitted since fiscal year 2001. While the percentage awarded is only 42.9% so far, only 22% have been denied; 35% were still pending notification at the end of the fiscal year.
