

UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA BOARD OF TRUSTEES

March 12, 2001

The University of Southern Indiana Board of Trustees met in regular session on Monday, March 12, 2001, in the University Conference Center. Present were Trustees Bruce Baker, Louise Bruce, Ryan Helzerman, Patrick Hoehn, David Huber, Tina Kern, Harolyn Torain, and James Will Sr. Also attending were President H. Ray Hoops, Vice Presidents John Byrd, Robert Reid, Richard Schmidt, and Sherrianne Standley; Faculty Senate Chair Mark Krahling; and Student Government Association President Rick Hudson.

There being a quorum present, the meeting was called to order at 2:45 p.m.

SECTION I - GENERAL AND ACADEMIC MATTERS

A. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF JANUARY 11, 2001, MEETING

On a motion by Ms. Kern, seconded by Mr. Baker, the minutes of the January 11, 2001, meeting <u>were</u> <u>approved</u>.

B. ESTABLISHMENT OF NEXT MEETING DATE, TIME, LOCATION

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees was set for Saturday, May 5, 2001.

C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Hoops began the meeting by reporting on activities related to the 2001 Indiana General Assembly. He reported that in mid-January, he presented the University's 2001-2003 operating and capital budget requests to the House Ways and Means Committee. On February 14, USI staff, students, and alumni gathered in Indianapolis for Higher Education Day at the State House. Representatives of all of Indiana's public institutions – several hundred students, alumni, and friends of higher education – met with legislators and discussed the needs of higher education. USI had more than 45 representatives among the group.

He noted that USI hosted the Evansville hearing on redistricting of legislative districts on March 7. Several legislators from the House of Representatives Elections and Apportionment Committee were on campus for the event. The committee heard public testimony on the issue of redistricting and its impact on southwestern Indiana.

Dr. Hoops was pleased to report that the Commission for Higher Education has given approval for the Master of Science in Health Administration and the Master of Science in Occupational Therapy. He announced that the Commission has approved the USI proposal for a baccalaureate in applied computer science and that USI's request for an engineering program awaits Commission consideration.

Dr. Hoops reported that Academic Affairs staff members have been in discussion with the Indiana National Guard to explore bringing a Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) program to campus. Together they are investigating requirements necessary for a program, and the board will be provided with additional information at a later time. Dr. Hoops noted that while the addition of an ROTC program does not require board approval, he wants the Board of Trustees to be aware of these discussions. He added that he believes such a program will be a positive development, attractive to prospective and currently enrolled students.

President Hoops announced that the popular Ropewalk Writers Conference held each summer has been expanded to include a winter weekend program. Twenty writers were enrolled in workshops on poetry and fiction the first weekend in March.

He reported that in a continuing effort to partner with regional schools, Extended Services will provide training in technology tools and resources for teachers in the Evansville Vanderburgh School Corporation. Sixty-four teachers are enrolled for spring workshops and another 100 teachers are on a waiting list for training during the next school year.

Dr. Hoops reminded the Board that at its last meeting, interest was expressed in understanding more about how USI delivers instruction with technology. He called on Vice President Reid to introduce the presenters of a demonstration in on-line learning. Dr. Reid introduced Dr. Karen Bonnell, Director of Instructional Technology Services and Associate Professor of Communications, and Dr. Judith Halstead, Associate Professor of Nursing and Director of Instructional Services and Resources, who demonstrated ways in which web-based instruction and on-line learning are used in USI classes. Dr. Bonnell noted that for more information, members can log on to <u>www.online.usi.edu</u> and browse the web site as a guest.

President Hoops noted that the USI/EPI-HAB Center for Disability Studies offered its first public program in early March with representatives from nearly 50 area employers attending a workshop on "Employing the Handicapped." The program was co-sponsored by the Metropolitan Evansville Chamber of Commerce and the Workforce Investment Board.

He reported that the Wellness Office has offered a wide range of programs targeted to various student lifestyle needs such as exercise, nutrition, and social and emotional issues. He noted that the opening of the Recreation and Fitness Center will enhance these programs. He thanked the trustees for their participation in the ribbon-breaking ceremony earlier in the day, and reported that a more formal grand opening is planned for student in the fall

President Hoops called on Mr. Hudson for a report from the Student Government Association.

Mr. Hudson reported that since its Spring Retreat in January, SGA has discussed and addressed issues including safety, availability of pay phones, parking, recommended improvements in academic advising, and the creation of new campus activities. SGA also proposed the creation of a Student Activity Fee. The fee was discussed at today's Finance Committee and will be recommended for approval by the Board at a future meeting.

Mr. Hudson reported that approximately 20 students were in the delegation that attended Higher Education Day at the Statehouse on February 14 and that those in attendance enjoyed the opportunity to participate.

He noted that SGA's Eagle Athletic Support Committee has supported the basketball teams by sponsoring a Basket Brawl dress up night in January, a fan bus to the Kentucky Wesleyan games in Owensboro, and the sale of reduced-price student tickets to the GLVC Tournament. The committee sponsored the Fan Jam at the last home game of the season. Approximately 500 students attended the event, which included food, games, and prizes. SGA hopes to make the Fan Jam an annual event.

Mr. Hudson reported that in conjunction with Black History Month, SGA member Shannon Hoehn created a pamphlet titled A Celebration of Black Culture's Prominent Figures: Past, Present, and Future. The pamphlet, created to increase students' awareness of diversity, was distributed to the student body during the month of February.

He also reported that through generous funding provided by the USI Foundation, SGA has received \$5,000 for student travel expenses. Students and organizations will submit applications for the funds, which will allow them to attend leadership and academic conferences, retreats, and workshops.

Mr. Hudson ended his report by announcing that SGA Elections will take place during the last week in March.

Dr. Hoops reported that USI was pleased to host the Student Housing Association 2001 Indiana Residence Hall Organization's annual conference on our campus. More than 150 students from colleges across the state participated in leadership programs and personal development seminars.

Related to student housing, the President noted that the board would hear a report later in the meeting that Student Residence Building No. 3 is moving swiftly toward an opening for the fall semester. He announced that as USI continues the tradition of naming residence halls for Indiana's governors,

Student Residence Building No. 3 will be known as O'Bannon Hall, named for our sitting governor. He also announced that the access road to O'Bannon Hall will be named Rochelle Lane in honor of the late Dr. Charles Rochelle, one of Evansville's most prominent educators, who also was a leader in the African American community and held an honorary doctorate from USI.

Dr. Hoops called on Vice President Reid to report on faculty leaves for the 2001-2002 academic year. Dr. Reid called attention to a handout listing recommended faculty leaves of absence.

President Hoops called on Vice President Reid to introduce the academic presentation from the Communications Department. Dr. Reid introduced Mr. Robert W. Jeffers, Instructor in Communications, who serves as the advisor to a student group that participates in the annual American Advertising Federation competition. Mr. Jeffers reported on the process, guidelines, and goals of the AAF competition, in which teams of students present integrated marketing communications projects. He noted that this year's AAF competition client is Daimler/Chrysler and the international campaign prepared by each student team is intended to enhance Daimler/Chrysler's brand image. He introduced two students who are members of this year's presentation team, Jessica Campbell and Andrea Alabaugh, who shared their experiences associated with the AAF competition. Mr. Jeffers closed by reporting that USI has finished in the top division of its district in 1999 and 2000, finishing fourth in 1999.

President Hoops reported that Career Services and Placement joined forces with Historic Southern Indiana to host the tenth annual Internship Job Fair in February. Sixty employers attended, seeking interns from 25 different academic majors in all of the five schools. He noted that student attendance increased from 183 last year to 334 this year, an indication of the growing interest in internships.

He also reported that counselors from the Student Financial Assistance Office participated in College Goal Sunday in February at Ivy Tech State College in Evansville. USI has been an active participant in this program since its inception in 1990. College Goal Sunday is a statewide program that provides free information and assistance to Indiana families applying for college financial aid. The program targets low-income students who need financial aid to attend college and who need help applying for that aid. About 150 students and their families attended this year.

Dr. Hoops commented that USI has formed a chapter of College Mentors for Kids, Inc. The chapter is dedicated to cultivating ongoing mentoring relationships between college students and "at risk" elementary students through shared learning experiences on campus and in the community. Activities focus on education, arts and culture, and social responsibility. Seven USI students, partnered with seven first grade students from Culver Elementary School, will work with seven first grade students from Culver Elementary School during the next four years. This program complements and extends other volunteer mentoring work being done by student athletes in USI's intercollegiate athletic program and the "One-on-One" program coordinated by the Volunteer Services office.

Dr. Hoops reported that the Office of International Programs and Services and the International Club co-sponsored the 7th annual International Food Expo in February. More that 500 people sampled the international cuisine from 18 countries around the world. Various international students performed traditional dances and music, making the Food Expo the culmination of the international week celebration, a series of events designed to increase the awareness of – and appreciation for – the cross-cultural diversity on campus.

President Hoops was pleased to announce that today's agenda includes the list of degree candidates for the Class of 2001, the largest ever at 1,390. Included in the class are 98 students who will graduate cum laude; 71 who will graduate magna cum laude; and 9 who will graduate summa cum laude with perfect 4.0 grade point averages. He noted that this year, USI also will graduate the first students who have been enrolled in the USI Honors Program, now completing its fourth year as a campus program. This increasing number of honors graduates is an indication of the growing number of academically talented students who are choosing USI for their undergraduate preparation. He reminded the trustees that USI's Commencement has moved to Sunday afternoon, May 6, and events such as the Board of Trustees meeting and the Reception and Dinner for Graduating students will be held on Saturday, May 5.

Dr. Hoops reported that several talented alumni will return to campus this spring to share with students what they have learned in their professions. The Office of Alumni and Volunteer Services works with each of the academic schools to sponsor these visits by alumni who are distinguishing themselves in

their careers. The President extended an invitation to the trustees to participate in any of these programs that fit their schedules.

The President called on Faculty Senate Chair Mark Krahling, who reported on the Faculty Senate's 2001 budget request. Dr. Krahling noted that the priorities of the Faculty Senate are funding for technology, the library, and additional faculty positions. He reported that while technology and library funding are consistent priorities, he believes that the University has made improvements in the past year in both of these areas. He also noted that while funding for additional faculty positions has been made available for the past few years, the Faculty Senate is concerned that the desired ratio of full time faculty to students be maintained. He also reported that the H. Lee Cooper Core Curriculum Teaching Award, an important recognition of the contribution of the core curriculum to overall student success, will be awarded for the first time this year.

President Hoops ended the President's Report by noting that the University family was saddened by the loss of three retired employees since the board last met. Dr. Aldo Cardarelli, professor emeritus of education, died January 26; Mr. Charles Lonnberg, catalog librarian and professor emeritus of library science, died March 1; and Mr. Charles Wilhite, retired maintenance mechanic, died February 21. He acknowledged their contributions to USI's development and extended sympathy to their families.

D. REPORT OF THE LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

Chair Bruce Baker reported that the Long Range Planning Committee met prior to the board meeting and received a report from Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs Charles Harrington on Student Characteristic and Assessment Profiles.

E. APPROVAL OF CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES

The candidates for master, baccalaureate, and associate degrees and candidates for postbaccalaureate certificates, to be conferred May 6, 2001, are listed in Exhibit I-A.

On a motion by Mrs. Torain, seconded by Ms. Kern, the awarding of the respective degrees was approved subject to the completion of all requirements.

F. APPROVAL OF CANDIDATES FOR HONORARY DEGREES

On a motion by Ms. Kern, seconded by Mr. Baker, the conferral of the following honorary degrees at the May 6, 2001, Commencement <u>was approved</u>.

DOCTOR OF SCIENCE to Dr. James S. Vinson, who will retire this year after fourteen years of distinguished service as the president of the University of Evansville.

DOCTOR OF LETTERS to Ms. Helen Thomas, nationally known columnist and White House correspondent, who will bring the Commencement Address.

G. APPOINTMENT OF NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Mr. Will appointed Mr. McKenna, Mrs. Bruce, and Mrs. Torain to serve on a nominating committee to prepare a slate of officers for 2001-2002.

SECTION II - FINANCIAL MATTERS

A. REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Chair Tina Kern reported that the Finance and Construction Committees held a joint meeting prior to the board meeting. She called on Vice President Schmidt who reported that, as a result of the successful sale of revenue bonds for Student Residential Building No. 3, USI now has in place an auxiliary financing system to replace bonds for individual projects.

Ms. Kern reported that the committee received an update on the investments of the VEBA Trust Account.

She noted that the committee reviewed a proposed student activity fee and called on Vice President John Byrd to review the fee. Vice President Byrd reported that the Student Government Association has proposed the development of a non-mandatory student activity fee to fund recreational and fitness activities and a wide variety of other student activities. The Board of Trustees will be asked to approve the fee at a future meeting.

Ms. Kern reported that Diana Biggs, Director of Internal Audit, presented the proposed annual audit plan and reviewed recently completed audits.

Ms. Kern reported that the committee recommended by consensus the approval of the budget appropriations, adjustments, and transfers in Exhibit II-D. On a motion by Ms. Kern, seconded by Mr. Baker, the budget appropriations, adjustments, and transfers in Exhibit II-D were approved.

B. REPORT OF THE CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE

Chair Tina Kern reported that the Construction Committee reviewed the change orders in Exhibits II-A and II-B C below and recommends approval.

C. APPROVAL OF CHANGE ORDERS FOR THE STUDENT RESIDENTIAL BUILDING NO. 3 PROJECT AND THE RECREATION AND FITNESS CENTER PROJECT

The proposed change orders in Exhibits II-A and II-B were approved.

D. UPDATE ON CURRENT CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Mr. Will called on Mr. Schmidt who introduced Director of Facilities Operations and Planning Steve Helfrich to report on current construction projects. Mr. Helfrich reported that the completion of the Recreation and Fitness Center requires only minor interior projects and outdoor site work.

Mr. Helfrich noted that the rate of progress on Student Residential Building No. 3 has improved since his last report and that he is optimistic about a timely completion of the building.

He reported that renovation has begun on the lower level of the Forum Wing in the Wright Administration Building. This space will be used by Instructional Technology Services and Distance Learning and will include two computer labs.

Mr. Helfrich announced that the Gray Building in the McDonald East Apartment Complex will be renovated during the summer months, the first of many building renovations scheduled in the student apartment complex over the next several years.

He noted that planning continues for the expansion of food service and bookstore space in the University Center and construction work will begin in April.

He closed with a report that the final plans for the Science/Education Classroom Building will be presented to the board at its meeting in May, and that bids will be sought soon thereafter for both the site work and the building construction.

E. UPDATE ON 2001 SESSION OF THE INDIANA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Associate Vice President for Business Administration Cindy Brinker reported on the status of the University's 2001-03 budget request (Exhibit II-C) and other legislation of interest to the University pending before the Indiana General Assembly.

SECTION III - PERSONNEL MATTERS

A. APPROVAL OF ANNUAL AUTHORIZATION FOR EMPLOYMENT OF FACULTY AND STAFF

The University of Southern Indiana Board of Trustees, pursuant to Indiana Code 20-12-1-4, annually authorizes the President of the University of Southern Indiana to employ faculty and staff and to establish salaries and wages within budgetary capabilities. The last authorization was on March 6, 2000.

On a motion by Mr. Huber, seconded by Ms. Kern, the Board of Trustees <u>authorized</u> the President of the University to employ qualified faculty and staff, to grant leaves of absence, and to establish salaries, wages, and benefits for employees within the capabilities of the budget. Further, the Board of Trustees, which establishes the employment contract for the President of the University, including salary and benefits, <u>authorized</u> the Chair of the Board of Trustees to convey to the President his employment contract, including salary and benefits.
