

The entry-level Doctor of Occupational Therapy (OTD) Program is designed for students who have a baccalaureate degree and are ready to apply for the entry-level graduate program in occupational therapy. The OTD Program does not have a preference as to the major for the bachelor's degree as long as the required prerequisites courses are completed. The best undergraduate major is one in an area in which the student would enjoy working after obtaining the undergraduate degree and should be selected based on the student's interests.

How do I become an occupational therapist?

First, you must complete an accredited educational program. Accredited programs are available in colleges, universities and vocational, technical or community colleges throughout the country. There are no on-the-job training programs in hospitals or other health-care facilities.

What kinds of educational programs are available?

To become an occupational therapist (OT), you must complete a master's or doctorate program. Each type of program includes a minimum of six months of supervised clinical education or fieldwork. Because educational requirements vary from school to school, it is important to obtain specific information from each institution and program.

Can I transfer credits from another educational program toward a degree in occupational therapy?

OT program requirements differ among institutions. If you have completed courses in another discipline, or are considering taking prerequisites at another educational institution, contact the individual occupational therapy program about their requirements. The USI OT Program Chair can review your transcripts and offer recommendations.

How do I find an occupational therapy educational program that fits me?

Students can enter the OT Profession as a Certified Occupational Therapy Assistant (COTA) or as a Registered Occupational Therapist (OTR). Most COTA programs lead to an associate degree, but in the near future, COTA programs may lead to a bachelor's degree. All OT and OTA programs must meet standards developed by the Accreditation Council of Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) and all graduates must pass a national examination before obtaining a license to practice. USI is one of only a few institutions that offer both OT and OTA Programs.

What is the employment outlook for occupational therapists?

The employment outlook for OTs is bright! Recent information published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics has projected the demand for OTs is expected to grow 24% from 2016–2026, much faster than in other fields. OTs held about 126,900 positions in the United States in 2018.

Where do occupational therapists work?

One of the greatest advantages of a career in OT is the wide variety of opportunities available to graduates. OTs work with all age groups to promote health and wellness, and prevent disease and/or injury. OTs also work in schools with students who have learning disabilities or behavioral problems. Others work in pediatric hospitals with premature infants or with children born with cerebral palsy, Erb's palsy or Down syndrome. OTs work with individuals in their homes, at community centers, in rehabilitation hospitals, businesses and skilled nursing facilities. In these settings, OT's help people with traumatic injuries, stroke, Alzheimer's disease or mental health problems, learn to live productive lives through the use of meaningful occupations.

What is the average salary earned by an occupational therapist?

Earning potential for occupational therapy personnel is very good, however salaries may vary somewhat with practice settings and geographic location. According to the U.S. Department of Labor, the median annual wage for occupational therapists was \$84,270 in May 2018. The median wage is the wage at which half the workers in an occupation earned more than that amount and half earned less. The lowest 10 percent earned approximately \$55,490, and the highest 10 percent earned approximately \$120,750.

ACCREDITATION

The entry-level occupational therapy doctoral degree program has applied for accreditation and has been granted Candidacy Status by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA), located at 7501 Wisconsin Avenue, Suite 510E, Bethesda, MD 20814. ACOTE's telephone number c/o AOTA is (301) 652-AOTA and its web address is acoteonline.org. The program must have a preaccreditation review, complete an on-site evaluation and be granted Accreditation Status before its graduates will be eligible to sit for the national certification examination for the occupational Therapy (NBCOT). After successful completion of this exam, the individual will be an Occupational Therapist, Registered (OTR). In addition, all states require licensure to practice; however, state licenses are usually based on the results of the NBCOT Certification Examination. A felony conviction may affect a graduate's ability to sit for the NBCOT certification examination or attain state licensure.
