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CSWE-FIELD EDUCATION (2022)

- "Signature pedagogies are elements of instruction and of socialization that teach future practitioners the fundamental dimensions of professional work in their discipline—to think, to perform, and to act ethically and with integrity...
- The intent of field education is to integrate the theoretical and conceptual contribution of the classroom with the practical world of the practice setting...
- Field education is designed, supervised, coordinated, and evaluated based on criteria which students demonstrate through the Social Work Core Competencies."

(Council on Social Work Education, 2022)



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THE MISSION OF FIELD EDUCATION

- In Field, the focus turns from the **acquisition** of knowledge to the **application** of knowledge.
- Students are provided with opportunities to apply the social work knowledge and skills obtained in the classroom to actual practice situations.
- When a student completes field, he/she should be ready to enter the social work profession as an employee.

(Bogo & Sewell, 2019)



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SIGNIFICANCE OF FIELD EDUCATION

"It is in the field where we truly learn to *be* a social worker" (Bogo & Sewell, 2019, 1)





FIELD EDUCATION

- In Field placement, students apply their learning to professional social work encounters.
- Each student is unique in regard to their personal background and experiences.
- This highlights the need for social work educators to better understand how field education can lead to greater personal and professional awareness for students.

(Marlowe et al., 2015)



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PROMOTING PROFESSIONALISM

A study completed by Roulston et al. (2018) found that the learning activity for developing practice competence and professional identity ranked highest by students was being given constructive feedback (368). Having an opportunity to think critically and reflectively about the social work role was identified as particularly important for developing professional identity (369).





FIELD EDUCATION

"Practice learning enables students to begin identifying themselves as social workers and internalizing the role" (Nixon & Murr, 2006).

Field Education promotes the socialization of students "to think and act like a social worker" (Bogo, 2015, 318).





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ASESSMENT ROLE

- Required to complete an annual Field Program Review as part of Field Director role.
- Identify gaps as well as areas for improvement in Field Education program.



FIELD INSTRUCTOR FEEDBACK

- Opportunity to provide feedback annually.
- Via a Qualtrics survey.
- Link distributed to Field Instructor emails at the end of every Spring semester.
- Request feedback regarding Field
 Departmental support/procedures as well
 as preparation of students for field
 placement.



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QUALTRICS SURVEY RESULTS

- Noticed a trend indicating the need for the development of professional behavior/skills for our field interns.
- For many students, this was their first experience with a professional social work agency.





IDENTIFIED NEED AREAS

- Documentation Skills
- Professional Etiquette
- Time Management Skills
- Organizational Skills
- Self-Advocacy
- Self-Care
- Professional Communication(i.e. email etiquette, phone etiquette)



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SAMPLE COMMENTS

How could the BSW or MSW program better prepare social work students for a field practicum in your agency:

- "Work etiquette and business attire for the agency"
- "Documentation prep"
- "Students would benefit from a professional self-care plan already established before entering field"



SAMPLE COMMENTS (Con't)

- "More information on appropriate dress"
- "Talk to them about cell phone use during the practicum"
- "More focus on soft skills, professional dress, time management"





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IMPACT OF COVID

- Students have experienced a form of isolation over the past two years.
- Limited interaction with others.
- Further contributed to gap in professionalism.





- All Field Students required to complete an orientation prior to starting Field Internship.
- A two hour orientation for BSW Junior students and MSW Generalist level interns.
- An in-class orientation for BSW Senior level interns.
- Discussion of "dos and don'ts" related to professional behavior.

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PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

- Professional Development Seminars prepared and presented by the Field Graduate Assistant (G.A.)
- Both in-person and pre-recorded.
- Topics reflective of the professional development needs identified by Field Instructors.
