

"WOMEN OF PARADISE" TRAM TOUR WITH REBECCA MAY HOPE

In honor of Women's History Month, Historic New Harmony will host a specialty tram tour from 1 to 3 p.m. Thursday, March 13 with author and researcher Rebecca May Hope.

Rebecca May Hope is the 2023 recipient of the Arlene Feiner Memorial Research Grant for Women's Studies from the Working Men's Institute (WMI). During the tram tour, May Hope will share additional information about the female Boatloaders. Our route will start at the Atheneum Visitors Center and include stops in town associated with these women and their descendants. This is a fantastic opportunity to learn more about an aspect of New Harmony's past not often talked about in history books!

May Hope will also present her research on the women of the Boatload of Knowledge at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 12 at the WMI. Her presentation, *Women of Paradise: Legacy of the Female Boatloaders*, explores the stories and legacies of the women and girls who came to New Harmony in 1826. This event at the WMI is free and open to the public.



ENCOUNTERING: IO PALMER, PAVLINA VAGIONI AND ANNA TSOUHLARAKIS MARCH 1-APRIL 12

New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art (NHGCA) proudly presents *Encountering: Io Palmer*; *Pavlina Vagioni and Anna Tsouhlarakis*, a three-person exhibition reflecting on themes of cross-cultural trade, exchange and diasporas. *Encountering* explores intersectional identities and cross-cultural frameworks over time: both themes concomitant with the overlapping histories comprising present-day New Harmony, Indiana. Works on view encompass sculpture, collage, assemblage and non-traditional art materials, foregrounding the ways in which approaches to material culture shift over time. *Encountering* offers timeless

yet interconnected perspectives on identity, investigating both the tensions and possibilities existing at global crossroads and the complexities that necessarily result.
