



 A student may apply a maximum of twelve credit hours toward Core 39 from a four-course sequence of any of the following languages:

ARAB 101, 102, 203, 204, 306; CHIN 101, 102, 203, 204, 306; FREN 101, 102, 203, 204, 306; GERM 101, 102, 203, 204, 306; JAPN 101, 102, 203, 204, 306; LATN 101, 102, 203, 204, 306; and SPAN 101, 102, 203, 204, 306.

In the language course sequences, any nine hours from 101, 102, 203 or 204 can apply to the BA requirement. A maximum of three hours from either 204 or 306 can be applied to the World Language and Culture Ways of Knowing requirement of Core 39.

 Students earning a bachelor's degree which is not designated as a BA or BS must choose either the BA or BS track for the purposes of Core 39 requirements.
